When you receive this, your December Messenger, know you are in the season of Advent. You are called to do at least two specific things during this season. One is to prepare for Christ's coming into the world. What does this mean for you? Is it something smothered by all the other aspects of preparation you know that await you? No doubt that will include all the gift ordering and maybe actual shopping in stores. Then there are groceries to buy and the baking to do, plus the cards to write or messages to send. It often seems the preparation list gets longer the more you think about it. With all these needs you might be thinking, "when and how do I prepare for Christ's coming into the world?" I suggest you will benefit greatly by taking a few minutes each day to ponder that very question. You will be feeding your spirit, your soul. As your soul is the part of you that will last for eternity, I hope you think it is important to nurture it!

The other thing to do is to realize Advent is a time of waiting. Children get excited as well as impatient about waiting for Santa which is often what Christmas means to them. But I invite you to see the waiting as intentional. Just as Mary 's pregnancy, as far as we know, took the normal 9 months and she needed to wait all that time for her baby to be born, so you are asked to wait for the birth of Jesus.

How do you "see" the nativity, and the Holy Family? Is Mary a white woman who looks like a pregnant American teenager with her white fiancée? Some years ago, I had the experience of discussing what Mary and Jesus looked like with my high school boys' group in Newark. They were all either African-American or Latino youth living in the Newark "projects." From our

conversation I understood they all assumed Jesus was white and so were Mary and Joseph. Any pictures they had seen cemented this understanding. When I refuted it and said that Jesus would have looked like one of the Latino teens, they were amazed. In fact, one young man was named "Jesus" but pronounced as a Latino name. So, it was a little ironic to say "Jesus" looked like "Jesus."

You know Jesus came in to the world as middle eastern, in that culture and with that appearance. Yes, he came into God's very diverse world. It is a world with people of many different skin colors, facial features, body sizes. He spoke Aramaic and maybe Hebrew and/or Greek. He did not speak English or look like you. God intentionally created diversity in this world. You are different from other peoples but all are part of God's creation. "God so loved the world...." people quote. Yes, God so loved the whole world with all its intentional diversity. Nowhere in the Bible does it say white is best. This year I invite you to celebrate all God's creativity in a world of very diverse people. As you do this, I hope it will remind you of the need to care for others as you care for our planet earth, and hope that the decisions recently made at Glasgow are implemented.

I also hope you will remember this when you see all the white nativity scenes this Christmas. I hope you will prepare and wait expectantly, patiently, and reverently for the coming into our world of the One who is the babe of Bethlehem and Christ the Lord. Amen.

The Office of Government Affairs of The Episcopal Church represents us on critical public policy issues, advocating for positions taken by our bishops. Opportunities to Grow in Faith

Inquirer's & Confirmation Classes

There could be a Confirmation class for students 8th grade and older. Students who attend can be Confirmed next year if they so choose. Parents of students in this age group are encouraged to speak with Margaret for details about the class.



There could be teenagers from District churches joining our group. An adult Inquirer's class is offered either on a Sunday after worship or during the week. Please talk to Margaret if you are interested in attending. A class usually lasts for 5 sessions.

The class is for those unfamiliar with the teachings of the Church in general and/or the Episcopal Church in particular. During the class, we allow time for discussion of any questions you may have. A booklet is provided with reading assignments.

After completing the class, you may choose to be confirmed by the Bishop at a local church or at the diocesan cathedral. If you were

Confirmed in another tradition, you can be **Received** by the Bishop at this service.

If you feel you would like to renew your Confirmation vows, you can choose to do that at the service. The Bishop will lay hands upon you and pray for you, similar to the way she welcomes and prays for Confirmands.

Education for Ministry, EFM (for all of us, nothing to do with ordination)

We have two groups meeting on Wednesdays, one from 2:30-4:30 p.m. with participants mostly coming here (sitting well apart from one another) as well as on Zoom. The other from 7-9 p.m. meets by Zoom call. The Zoom number is available from Margaret.



Bible Study

There are two **daytime** Bible study groups. One meets in-person in the lower parish hall on **Mondays, 2 – 3:30 pm**; and is currently studying the Gospel of John. The other meets on **Thursdays, 11:00 – 12:00 noon** by free conference call; and is currently studying the Gospel of Luke. Contact Margaret for the conference call code. Since schedule conflicts often arise in the busy month of December, please watch weekly announcements or confirm dates and times with Margaret.

Little Donkey, Be Careful

This text is intended to be sung to the French folk tune we know as *Bring a Torch, Jeanette, Isabella*. It was particularly challenging for the poet, because the French language falls naturally into dactylic and trochaic meter, while our English language is more naturally iambic. In addition, the rhyme scheme is highly unusual: A, B, C, C, A, B. Clearly a children's hymn, nonetheless each verse ends by stating the joyful mystery of the Incarnation. This hymn text was "officially" published by the Episcopal church publishing house.
