As a child. I remember learning the calendar poem which includes the words "March winds and April showers bring forth May flowers." It always made me a little afraid of March, as windy days can be challenging. We also associate wind with change, as in "the wind of change" whereby we acknowledge that one of the constants in the world (as well as death and taxes) is change. March will bring change in the form of a change of season. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 2. Are you ready for Lent? It's a time of penitence and reflection. You are encouraged to be aware of the things that can impede and divert your relationship with God. What I love about Lent is that it's a time when I have good resources which help me with this inward and spiritual work. For example, Episcopal Relief and Development sends daily reflections. I have several books of reflections, so ask me for one if you'd like one. Our Lent study this year will be a time to read and reflect on daily meditations from the staff at the Episcopal cathedral in Washington, DC. (please ask if you need a copy). You can join the group on Tuesday afternoons or Thursday evenings either in-person or by Zoom, and join the group for Stations of the Cross before the discussion time. I encourage you to see Lent as a time to reflect on your life and on your relationship with God. While it can be seen as a time to give up something, I feel it is even better spent as a time given to meditation, reading and reflection.

On February 13 we had our Annual Meeting and fortunately the few inches of light snow that

arrived that morning did not hamper too many of you. I think all who attended felt heartened to see a good crowd in attendance. The sanctuary had a change – all the chairs are now back there with rows still further apart, of course, than they used to be pre-Covid days. At the meeting you voted for the new leadership team, adding 4 people. They are listed in this Messenger, with the ministries for which they are the liaisons. A new team is another change. Messiah is blessed with wonderful leadership. I urge you to pray for our leaders and the ministries they lead.

John P., our treasurer, presented the financial report for 2021; we found his positive report very encouraging. He also presented the 2022 budget and highlighted the unknown features for the later part of this year. Following John's presentation, Kathy K. also spoke words of encouragement. Then, as always, I invited everyone to share what they thought had been the positive features of 2021. You will find them on page 4 "**Highlights of the Year Gone By**".

Yes, this year will bring changes, but you are all part of a wonderful congregation. Together, you are doing much to share the love of Jesus Christ in this challenged world.

I wish you a reflective, hopeful and inspiring Lent, and maybe more "Messiah miracles".




Ash Wednesday Worship

"Plus One" Campaign


This is a very simple way to remember families in need. When you go to the supermarket, just add one item to your cart. Your single item, added to everyone else's single item, will make a huge difference.

Lenten Program Stations of the Cross & Meditations

At 3 pm on Tuesday afternoons and 7 pm on Thursday evenings we will offer "Stations of the Cross" in the sanctuary and by Zoom.

We will also have groups meeting weekly, at 3:30 pm on Tuesdays and 7:30 pm on Thursdays, reading and discussing the book **The Pilgrim Way of Lent: Meditations from Washington National Cathedral**. Starting on Thursday, March 3, we will discuss the meditations for Ash Wednesday, and for all the days up to and including Sunday, March 6. Inquirer's & Confirmation Classes

There could be a Confirmation class for students 8th grade and older. Students who attend can be confirmed this year if they so choose. Parents of students in this age group are encouraged to speak with Margaret for details about the class. There could be teenagers from District churches joining our group. Food Deserts A Very Personal Perspective

I have not set foot in a grocery store in more than two years. How can that be? At the worst of Covid (pre-vaccines) the Heath Village staff provided shopping service from ShopRite. Later, I used the Weis order-on-line, placed-intrunk option. A Messiah angel also helped me for time to time. I now subscribe to Shipt delivery service and to Thrive Market.

I think often how many people cannot afford high rent, an automobile with insurance & a full gas tank, a computer. I count my blessings.

I have ventured inside at Walgreens and added a few edibles to my medical purchases. That drug store has a few aisles of canned goods, a small freezer case, an even smaller refrigerator. If I needed to shop there for all my food, I could buy canned soup, tuna, Spam, sugary "baked" beans: but no fresh vegetable. I could find peanut butter, jelly, but no bread; Triscuits & Wheat Thins but not the "hint of salt" variety I prefer. I could get V-8 juice, but not the low sodium variety. I'd find boxed cereal or instant oatmeal, but milk often at or past its "sell by" date. There might be canned peaches in heavy syrup, sugar-added applesauce: no fresh fruit. For lunch, how about bologna, ham, American "cheese" slices, Lunchables, I'd find frozen pizza, "TV dinners," ice cream; but the only yogurt would be full-fat and sugar-laden. There'd be an abundance of the 3 P's: potato chips. popcorn, pretzels. I'd find guite a selection of cookies and a whole aisle of candy and gum.

Vast numbers of people in our country live in "food deserts." They can reach a SevenEleven but not a ShopRite, so their food purchases are much like the unhealthy ones I just described. Even worse are the "food swamps," with only a



Popeyes Chicken and a Burger King, no grocery store at all. These situations abound in poor rural areas. In almost every major city, there are both food deserts and food swamps.

Have you ever had to fast prior to a medical procedure such as a colonoscopy? Did you find yourself out-of-sorts, unfocused, unable to concentrate? It wasn't just fear of the medical procedure! Very likely, you kept noticing your hunger and thirst and using a lot of energy to divert your attention away from the empty stomach and parched mouth. Thousands upon thousands of American children face every school day truly hungry or worried about when they will next get a meal. They cannot concentrate on getting the education that could offer them a route up from poverty.

Aldi's is a major low-price grocery chain with on-line "bells & whistles" — store locator, curbside pickup or delivery, etc.

Recently Aldi's has opened stores in many "food desert" areas. Larissa, my dear daughter-in-law, recently told me about her journey into the Bronx to shop at Aldi's. She reported, "It's a bit like Sam's Club, but no membership fee. It's not a huge warehouse and you don't have to buy huge quantities. Only store-brand generics (but they are every bit as good as the heavily-advertised brands.) Bring your own bags; pack it yourself at checkout. I couldn't believe how much \$100 could purchase! I'm so glad Aldi's is opening stores in so many urban poverty areas."


